Heron ~~is~~ are seen or feed there.  
~~the~~ Swallows used to nest in the  
porch, but have been discouraged

In the Church there is a colony of  
Pipistrella ~~Bats~~ who come & go  
through the airbricks in the East & West  
Ends.

We have heard from the Hawks & I.O.W
