It is difficult to separate the two manors of East and West Meon before the Norman Invasion of 1066.

824

Egbert, king of the West Saxons, to his prefect Wulfheard. 22 manetes on both sides of the River Meon.

956

Eadwig, king of the English and ruler of other peoples round about, to his thegn Eadric. 50 mansae at Meon, free of all the three common dues.

959

Edgar, ruler of all Britain, to his grandmother Eadgifu, replacing an earlier charter which she gave into his keeping, but which he lost. 65 mansae at Meon, free of all but the three common

dues.
