Bank on a bit of holiday tradition



May Day is traditonally the first day of

Traditionally, the day starts early, and people would rise at dawn to wash in the dew to promote youthfulness, returning home with arms full of May blossom (hawthorn) to decorate the houses.
Young girls would dance around the

Maypole with ribbons and bonfires would be lit to echo the light and the warmth of spring. The livestock were driven between the fires to ritually cleanse them and promote fertility for

the coming year.
For the people it was a time to spend on relationships, the unmarried to find partners and spend the day in noisy

Throughout the day horns were blown and much merriment and drinking was undertaken. The prettiest girl was chosen as May Queen and the King was dressed in 'the green of the forest'. The remains of this ancient festival

can still be seen today. The dancers are remembered still in the Morris-Men, and the Maypole is revived by school children. May Queens are still crowned and although the King is often forgotten, he lives on in the legends of Robin Hood and the green man.

For a chance to partipate in some of these ancient May Day rituals, take a trip to Butser Ancient Farm this Bank Holiday weekend to watch the burning of the wicker man (pictured right) and listen to the Druids explaining the ancient rites; or visit East Meon or Oakhanger May Fayre on Sunday (pictured left)

complete with Maypole dancing and the

procession of the May Queen.

If a slice of tradition isn't your thing, there are plenty of outdoor and family activities available locally to entertain and educate this May holiday.



The May bank holiday weekend sees a plethora of railway locomotives descending on the Rural Life Centre, Tilford's museum of country life. The engines, diesel, electric and steam, will be coming from all over the south

of England.
This event is the Old Kiln Light Railway's fifth annual Model Railway Exhibition and sees a wide variety of layouts representing full-sized originals from many periods in history.

From the Isle of Wight comes the Bembridge 00 scale model showing part of the

island's pre-war system. Travelling from fur-ther overseas is a Belgian tramway layout while from nearer to home, Folly Hill, Farnham, in fact, comes the smallest scale layout called Pennington which is at 2mm to the foot. The largest models will be running on a three and a half inch gauge tramway layout.

Representing a small private country estate system in miniature is the St Reatham Hall layout whilst outside the exhibition buildings a similar full-sized system will be operating. This is the Old Kiln Light Railway itself, and

the venerable 1920s steam locomotive, the venerable 1920s steam locomotive, Elouise, will be hauling passenger trains all day on the newly extended two foot gauge line. The track, which has been increased in length by almost a half during the past year, now runs through a deep woodland cutting to Millswood Station and circles three quarters of the museum's site.

The OKLR Model Railway Exhibition takes place on Saturday, May 3 and is open from 10am to 5pm at the Rural Life Centre. For further information telephone 01252 795571.

Village fair is May 2 cancelled

EAST Meon country fair has been declared a washout as the rain keeps coming down.

The annual bank holiday Monday event attracts up to 4,000 visitors and just days before this year's fair, the threat of more bad weather has forced its cancellation.

Event spokesman Anella Parker-Martin said: "I think the committee knew when we met early in the week it wouldn't go ahead, and I would stress it hasn't just been postponed, it has been cancelled completely for this year. A bigger, better event will go ahead next year.

"The reason is the amount of rain recently – the village green where the fair is held is waterlogged, the parking fields are waterlogged and there's more rain due on fair

day. Trying to get hundreds of bogged down cars towed out of a field would have been a chaotic nightmare, and a wet, miserable, muddy fair wouldn't have been fun.

"It is very sad for everyone – visitors, stallholders and those providing entertainment."

Each year the fair raises around £10,000 to subsidise the village hall. East Meon Primary School also raises money by organising children's games.

Mrs Parker-Martin said: "Funds from the fair mean we can keep hire charges affordable so the hall is used.

"This is a real financial hit and we will have to organise other fundraisers at short notice.

"I imagine it will be a setback for the school as well."

Country fair shelved for first time in its history

A COUNTRY fair near Petersfiled has been cancelled for the first time in its history because of heavy rain.

Torrential rain and mud has forced the organisers of the East Meon Country Fair to

pull the plug on this weekend's show. Hundreds of people were due to attend the annual event on the village green this Bank Holiday Monday (May 7).

But Anella Parker-Martin said organisers

couldn't take the risk as the recent poor weather had turned the parking field into a quagmire.

She said: "The fields where we park the cars are totally waterlogged. We may get them in but there's no way we could get them out.

"We are really upset about it but we just can't risk it. It's the first time in our history that we've had to cancel the May Fair but safety comes first and we don't want people slipping and cars getting stuck."

The event would have included car stunts, dog show, animal displays, food and drink and live music.

Mrs Parker-Martin claimed the cancellation is also bad news for the village hall, which benefits from the gate money.

"All the money we make goes to the village hall so it's really going to affect them.

"We could re-arrange but there's too much to do so we'll have just to wait till next May."

Counting the cost: more rain set for bank holiday

EXTREME weather and downpours have caused chaos, disappointment, misery and anger in East Hamp-

And the spell of wind and rain shows no sign of letting up as forecasters predict unsettled weather across the bank holiday weekend and on into early May

holiday weekend and on into early May. In Petersfield, debate over a new retirement homes built on fields known historically as water meadows has resurfaced after flash floods saw the estate's opening postponed.

Madeline Road overlooks the site and a resident said: "Extreme weather like this is exactly what government scientists are predicting for the future."

And the torrents have highlighted local flooding spots in town, such as the junction of High Street and Dragon Street, under the rail bridge near Amey industrial estate, The Avenue playing fields and scores of other places.

On Petersfield Heath, worries the lake had shrunk more than ever before have been eased by the rain, but concerns remain. Bailiff for the Heath Pond Association, Adrian Tipper, said: "The level was exceptionally low, and although it has risen this month by about five inches it is still lower than it should be, but it's looking better than it was and the fish haven't suffered."

aven't suffered." In East Meon the deluges have forced



organisers of the annual village fete on the green to cancel it. The fete raises much needed funds for local causes and the money will have to be found elsewhere this year.

A spokesman for Justchaps said: "Owner, Helen Salmon, has been left reeling and her house is now overflowing with items she had specially made for the event."

Hampshire Police has issued warnings for residents to stay away from fast running rivers, and is advising drivers take extra care on wet roads.
